> avigating the Salem Art Fair & Festival is kind of like house cleaning.

It's a bit overwhelming, but skip a spot, and you may regret it.

We suggest picking a corner and starting there.

She has an affinity for lines and shapes and how they play out on elongated spaces.

Her contemporary watercolor paintings, with a traditional Chinese influence, are a reflection of those details.

Vuu traveled from Austin, Texas, for the Salem Art Fair & Festival. This is her fifth year at the show.

"I like this show because it's really well-supported by the community," she said.

The artist has lived and worked in Seattle and Asia, and her art combines her cultural origins and extensive travels.

Vuu blends a rich, ebony, Chinese ink with watercolor on delicate, handmade paper to create cityscapes and plum blossoms.

Cathy McMullin of Mt. Angel was captivated by the paintings.

"I've been really into cityscapes and how they come together," she said.

Vuu's paintings range in price from \$25 for small prints to \$5,000 for some of the larger originals.

Abbey Bach Festival at end of July

ST. BENEDICT — There are music festivals throughout the Mid-Valley, but none is quite like the Abbey Bach Festival.

For one thing, no other music festival is sponsored by monks who have practiced hospitality as a key part of their mission for more than 1,000 years.

And no other music festival takes place on a hilltop that affords panoramic views of Marion County farmland and the Cascades.

Tickets still are available for the 39th Annual Abbey Bach Festival, which takes place July 28-30 at Mount Angel Abbey.

Each evening's program officially starts at 5:20 p.m. in the abbey's church with Vespers, the service of psalms sung by the abbey's Benedictine monks.

But many participants arrive hours earlier. They set elaborate tables to augment the limited tables and chairs provided, or they visit the retreat house and the renowned library designed by Alvar Aälto.

At 6 p.m., there is a musical performance in the abbey's church featuring performers from the Mid-Valley. This year, Salem's Paul Klemme will give an organ concert July 23; Klemme and trumpeter Gerald Webster will play

At 6:30 p.m., the monks will serve picnic baskets on the lawn. Each basket contains a simple supper with wine for four. If groups have fewer than four, the monks will introduce them to like-minded supper-mates — an example of Benedictine hospitality, said Sandra Chiodo, abbey spokeswoman.

At 8 p.m., the evening's featured performance starts in the Damian Center (now air-conditioned, for those who remember steaming nights of years ago). This year's performers are harpsichordist Luc Beauséjour, soprano Marie-Josée Lord, Isabelle Bozzini on baroque cella and Grégoire Jeav on baroque flute
